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
Drug-Related Deaths in Scotland

The Scottish Picture

- 5.2 million population
- 14 Health Boards
- 30 Alcohol and Drug Partnerships
- 15 Prisons
- 59,500 people with problem drug use
- 23,255 known to services
- 22-25,000 people prescribed methadone






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


Problem drug use 2012/13




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Drug-Related Deaths 1996-2014


Lord Advocate's Guidelines - allows the supply of naloxone to extend to staff working in services in contact with people at risk of opiate overdose

new legislation introduced 1st October 2015 = no GP or registered



new legislation
introduced 1st
October 2015 =
no prescription
or PGD
required

The Product



- Naloxone Hydrochloride 1mg/ml
 - 2ml pre-filled Syringe
 - 2 x 23g 1.25" muscle needles
 - Luer lock fitting
 - Flow chart and PIL
 - Tamper evident tape
- Moved to licensed community pack (Prenoxad)



Monitoring of Supplies

Information Services

2011-2014 data (report published annually)

- 11,270 in community
- 2,538 from prisons
- 700+ repeat supplies due to reported use

Target - 30% of people with problem
drug use by end March 2016

Scottish Prison Service

- Average daily population 7851 (2013/14)
- Transfer of prisoner health to NHS in Nov 2011
- Addiction prevalence testing
- 21% of population receiving methadone in 2014

So how does the naloxone programme work in prisons?



Opiaid-related deaths within 4 weeks of prison release


